Disaster Relief

—*Rev Amy Zucker Morgenstern* Rev. Jan Christian, Congregational Life Staff member for the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Pacific Western Region, sends us this very welcome information:

The UUĂ Disaster Relief Fund is now available for costs arising from fires in Northern California.

Being described as "a serious, critical, catastrophic event," the wild fires in Northern California continue to burn out of control. The death toll is at 31 and expected to climb as hundreds are still missing, including at least one member from our Napa congregation. Over 3,500 buildings have been lost. At least eleven of the homes destroyed belonged to members of our congregations, including members who relocated to the area after losing everything in Hurricane Katrina. The loss of cherished animal companions has also been reported.

This is when we remember that we belong to one another and that together we can do what we cannot do alone. To give to the UUA Disaster Relief Fund: <u>https://giving.uua.org/disaster-aid</u>. Jan adds: "I will be serving on the committee in charge of disbursing funds. News will go out to our PWR congregations and congregational life staff in other regions will be reaching out to their congregations as well. Fair-Trade Chocolate for Halloween:

After both services, fair-trade chocolate will be for sale at a table on the patio. Milk chocolate and dark chocolate minis will be sold for \$12 for a half-pound bag (50 pieces) and \$20 for a one-pound bag (100 pieces) Although the prices may seem high, this is not a fund-raiser; the prices are set to cover our costs. This is what it costs to buy chocolate harvested by people paid a living wage.

The chocolates are from Equal Exchange, a worker–owned cooperative that has been leading the Fair Trade movement since 1986. Cacao plantations are often worked by children who have been forcibly taken from home, and are deprived of schooling, rest, and play, and working without pay. Equal Exchange chocolates, unlike those from Hershey's, Mars, Nestle, and most other companies, are produced without slave labor. This is one small contribution we make to ending trafficking of human beings, which affects an estimated 30 million people worldwide.

Meet Mr. Barb Greve, Sabbatical Religious Educator

Mr. Barb Greve will serve as the half-time Sabbatical Religious Educator (SRE) at UUCPA from November 1, 2017 to March 1, 2018. He will be supervising the children, youth, and adult religious education programs while Rev. Dan Harper, UUCPA's Associate Minister of Religious Education, is on sabbatical.

Barb is credentialed by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) as a Religious Educator/Masters Level, with 11 years of experience as a Director of Religious Education (DRE) at various Unitarian Universalist congregations. Most recently, Barb served for 3 years as the Developmental DRE at Mt. Diablo UU Church in Walnut Creek.

Currently, Barb is serving as one of the Co-Moderators of the UUA, the highest volunteer position within Unitarian Universalism. Barb has also served as Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Starr King School for the Ministry, the Unitarian Universalist theological school in Berkeley.

Barb is a former staff member in the UUA's Office of Bi-sexual, Gay, Lesbian, and Transgender Concerns. Barb's mother served as a religious educator in a Unitarian Universalist congregation, so like Dan he is a second generation religious educator.

Since Barb will start work at UUCPA in November, the Children and Youth Religious Education Committee will supervise the children and youth religious education programs in October.

Members of the Sabbatical Committee – Maricia Scott, Edie Keating, Emma Grant-Bier, and Wynne Furth – will be able to answer your questions about the sabbatical. The Sabbatical Committee will host a social event to greet Barb when he arrives at UUCPA in November.

Verble, herself a member of the Cherokee Nation, tells a compelling story peopled with flawed yet sympathetic characters, sharing insights into Cherokee society on the parcels of land allotted to them after the Trail of Tears." Green Sanctuary

What's in a name? What's in a name such as "Green Sanctuary Committee"? That name has some history and connection to a movement in our denomination. In the

early years of this millennium, members of the Committee such as Ben Hammett, Hershey Julian, Jean McFadden, Richard Cassel and others climbed on a bandwagon driven by the UU Ministry for Earth to achieve certification for UUCPA as a "Green Sanctuary Congregation" — Certification came in 2007.

Ten years later committee members discussed at the October meeting whether the name is best for what we do and for communicating with the congregation, with other environmental groups and individuals. At least one committee member reported being confused by the name before he joined. Another suggested changing the name to "Environmental Justice Committee" and a third suggested "Environmental Action Committee".

In the workshop, we will address the process of advanced care planning from the foundation of our personal values and life priorities. Rev. Jen will highlight the "Stanford Letter Project" as one of several helpful resources for framing our reflection and discussion.

Rev. Jen Dillinger is an affiliate Community Minister at UUCPA and an interfaith chaplain at Stanford Hospital, specializing in pastoral education and palliative care. As a chaplain, she provides spiritual support to patients and their families at all phases of illness, including at the end of life.
